# **Parade Marshal**



The honor of Parade Marshal for the 2024 Woodsville-Wells River Fourth of July Celebration is given to Alex Sutherland of Bath, New Hampshire.

Alex was born on November 11, 1927 and grew up in New Canaan, Connecticut, the son of a gardener for the estate on which they lived. He began working at the local Ford garage as a teenager, until he was drafted into the Army at age 18. He underwent basic

training in Alabama, and thereafter served as a mechanic for the Army motor pool in Japan for two years until his honorable discharge. He then returned to New Canaan, Connecticut and worked as a mechanic for Ford and then self-employed. He and his late wife, Isabella Raymond Sutherland, purchased a vacation home on the River Road in Bath, New Hampshire and subsequently moved with their two sons to that location. He worked for H. G. Woods Lumber in Lisbon, New Hampshire (now Britton Lumber) and farmed into his 80's, raising and selling cattle, pigs, and eggs from as many as 300 chickens.

Alex is one of the three remaining World War Two veterans in our area, and deserves tremendous thanks for his service to this country. He is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 5245 and a member of Calvary Baptist Church in Woodsville.

It is with sincere gratitude and respect that Alex Sutherland has been chosen and recognized as the 2024 Grand Marshal. Alex, we thank you for your service to our country.

### Flag Etiquette

#### STANDARDS of RESPECT

The Flag Code, which formalizes and unifies the traditional ways in which we give respect to the flag, also contains specific instructions on how the flag is not to be used. They are:

- The flag should never be dipped to any person or thing. It is flown upside down only as a distress signal.
- The flag should not be used as a drapery, or for covering a speakers desk, draping a platform, or for any decoration in general. Bunting of blue, white and red stripes is available for these purposes. The blue stripe of the bunting should be on the top.
- The flag should never be used for any advertising purpose. It should not be embroidered, printed or otherwise impressed on such articles as cushions, handkerchiefs, napkins, boxes, or anything intended to be discarded after temporary use. Advertising signs should not be attached to the staff or halyard
- The flag should not be used as part of a costume or athletic uniform, except that
  a flag patch may be used on the uniform of military personnel, fireman,
  policeman and members of patriotic organizations.
- The flag should never have placed on it, or attached to it, any mark, insignia, letter, word, number, figure, or drawing of any kind.
- The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything.

When the flag is lowered, no part of it should touch the ground or any other object; it should be received by waiting hands and arms. To store the flag it should be folded neatly and ceremoniously.

The flag should be cleaned and mended when necessary.

When a flag is so worn it is no longer fit to serve as a symbol of our country, it should be destroyed by burning in a dignified manner.

#### Displaying the Flag Outdoors

When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting from a window, balcony, or a building, the union should be at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half staff.

When it is displayed from the same flagpole with another flag - of a state, community, society or Scout unit - the flag of the United States must always be at the top except that

the church pennant may be flown above the flag during church services for Navy personnel when conducted by a Naval chaplain on a ship at sea.

When the flag is displayed over a street, it should be hung vertically, with the union to the north or east. If the flag is suspended over a sidewalk, the flag's union should be farthest from the building.

When flown with flags of states, communities, or societies on separate flag poles which are of the same height and in a straight line, the flag of the United States is always placed in the position of honor - to its own right.

- .. The other flags may be smaller but none may be larger.
- .. No other flag ever should be placed above it.
- ..The flag of the United States is always the first flag raised and the last to be lowered.

When flown with the national banner of other countries, each flag must be displayed from a separate pole of the same height. Each flag should be the same size. They should be raised and lowered simultaneously. The flag of one nation may not be displayed above that of another nation.

#### Raising and Lowering the Flag

The flag should be raised briskly and lowered slowly and ceremoniously. Ordinarily it should be displayed only between sunrise and sunset. It should be illuminated if displayed at night.

The flag of the United States of America is saluted as it is hoisted and lowered. The salute is held until the flag is unsnapped from the halyard or through the last note of music, whichever is the longest.

#### Parading and Saluting the Flag

When carried in a procession, the flag should be to the right of the marchers. When other flags are carried, the flag of the United States may be centered in front of the others or carried to their right. When the flag passes in a procession, or when it is hoisted or lowered, all should face the flag and salute.

#### The Salute

To salute, all persons come to attention. Those in uniform give the appropriate formal salute. Citizens not in uniform salute by placing their right hand over the heart and men with head cover should remove it and hold it to left shoulder, hand over the heart. Members of organizations in formation salute upon command of the person in charge.

## **THANK YOU**

It has been my honor for many years now to write this thank you to the community for all the support our committee receives in presenting this annual 4th of July celebration. The celebration itself was first presented in 1981 and other than 2020 there has been a parade (actually a few people did walk/ride the parade route that year), field activities, and fireworks each year since. Many, many hours of planning by the committee members goes into the planning to make this day enjoyable for the thousands that show up to enjoy the sights, sounds and smells of the day.

One of the biggest efforts is actually raising the money to pay for all this entertainment. More than two-thirds of the money comes from businesses and communities that make donations and are listed in the annual souvenir booklet. The remaining 33% or so comes from raffle ticket sales and field activities. In total nearly \$30,000 is raised and spent each year for the celebration of our nation's birth.
